

## Sequence of Treaties in Each Issue-Area

### **Aerial Bombardment**

Hague 1922-23 (not a treaty): Rules concerning the Control of Wireless Telegraphy in Time of War and Air Warfare.

London 1930: Treaty for the Limitation and Reduction of Naval Armaments, (Part IV, Art. 22, relating to submarine warfare). (limited to 5 years)

London 1936 (not a treaty): Procès-verbal relating to the Rules of Submarine Warfare set forth in Part IV of the Treaty of London of 22 April 1930.

Geneva 1949: Convention (II) for the Amelioration of the Condition of Wounded, Sick and Shipwrecked Members of Armed Forces at Sea.
