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COURSE DESCRIPTION:

The study of body, gender, and sexuality has profoundly transformed the historiographical landscape in recent decades. It has become one of the key sites for an ongoing debate on the construction of historical narratives and the materiality of experience, questions of social agency and explorations of discourse. In a series of readings and discussions, we will introduce students to key concepts and debates, both in the past and in the present. By crossing the usual boundaries of national history, we will open a space for discussing a wide range of theoretical, methodological, and historical issues surrounding the concepts of body, gender and sexuality in history, while also making salient the politics of location in the production of historical knowledge.

TENTATIVE COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

- (1) Regular attendance at, and participation in, seminar sessions. Active class participation, along with an oral presentation, explained below, will count for one-third of one's grade.
- (2) We ask each student to find one or two study partners, who will serve as regular conversation partners throughout the course. We will explain this process (and its purpose) in class.
- (3) Three 3-4 page essays, to be submitted roughly at the end of each week. The essays should be analytic in nature, reflecting on some aspect of the weekly theme sessions. It should consciously employ at least one of the methodological approaches explored. These essays will also be exchanged with one's "study partners." (The essays will collectively count for one-third of one's grade.)
- (4) One oral presentation in class, to be chosen in consultation with the instructors. Presenters will be invited to post materials in advance on the C-Tools Website.
- (5) As a final assignment, we ask students to submit a review of an English-language article or book of their choice on gender history (approximately 5 pages). Students are asked to consult with their instructors on this assignment.
